A data paper makes other researchers aware of data that has been published and allows a researcher to give further context to their data and the way it has been generated or gathered; managed; and prepared for sharing. In his half-day event, we will hear from a number of specialists and humanities researchers about why you should share your data (and where) and why and how you should write about this data (and where!). We will also be introduced to a number of examples of recently published, and planned, open access humanities data papers.

We also hear more from the Open Library of Humanities, a nonprofit, diamond open access publisher in the humanities and social sciences.

Keynote speaker Dr Barbara McGillivray King's College London and The Alan Turing Institute

Barbara McGillivray is lecturer in digital humanities and cultural computation at King's College London. She holds a PhD in Computational Linguistics from the University of Pisa (2010). From 2011 to 2014 she worked as language technologist at the Dictionaries division of Oxford University Press and from 2014 to 2017 she worked as data scientist in the Open Research group of Springer Nature. She is very interested in supporting open data in Humanities research and has been editor-in-chief of the Journal of Open Humanities Data since 2019. She is also Turing fellow at The Alan Turing Institute, UK's national institute for data science and artificial intelligence, where she runs the Data Science and Digital Humanities special interest group. She is also president of SIGHUM, ACL's special interest group on Language Technologies for the Socio-Economic Sciences and Humanities.




